People ask “Why is it important to go back to my child’s country of birth?” While some adoptees may not want to visit their birth country, others do and would gain much from such a journey. This workshop will explore how going back to one’s country of birth can help find answers, create a sense of connectedness to people that share a common heritage, help build identity, and more. It will also provide things to think about when planning a trip to your child’s country of birth. The presenter will share stories and insight from her personal experience, as well as her knowledge gained while escorting adoptive family heritage journeys around the world.

Carmen Knight is an international, transracial adoptee from Peru. She graduated from Knox College with a double major in Social Science Education and Secondary Education. She has been active in the adoption community since June of 2006. Carmen currently is working with both the Ties program, which does heritage tours for international adoptees and their families, and Bridge Communications Inc., which does adoption education and diversity training. Some of her past experiences have included escorting heritage travel to Korea, Peru, Vietnam, China, Paraguay, and Guatemala; working at culture camps and adoptee camps; leading classes/ seminars about adoption topics at conferences and for various adoption agencies; speaking on adoptee panels; and most recently co-organizing an adoptive family weekend at the YMCA Minkani in Milwaukee.

This workshop will give an introduction to the principles of "in Touch Again" , an approach that originated in the [United Kingdom](#) and was developed by Agnes Bayley, Ph.D., who introduced it in the United States in the early 1980's. "In Touch Again" utilizes the sensory system as the basis of identification and repair of attachment issues and teaches a very gentle, yet respectful way of working with the child within the context of the family. "In Touch Again" is unique in that it encourages caregivers and parents to draw on the memories of their own attachment experiences to better understand the process their child is experiencing.

Nancy Hawkins, Psy.D., is a licensed psychologist with over 25 years of experience working with children and families in the area of attachment and bonding. Enrolled at the Leech Reservation , Nancy adds a cultural dimension to her work and has trained and created programs in the Native American community as well as the larger [Minnesota](#) adoption community. Nancy currently works as a private practitioner in [St. Louis Park](#) and as a consultant to the [Shakopee](#) Mdewakaton Sioux Community in [Prior Lake](#). Nancy is the president of In Touch Again, Inc., a nonprofit formed to support the work of Agnes Bayley and provide support and guidance to parents, caregivers, and clinicians.
